1.Explain how and why Muybridge shot his first film

Eadward Muybridge created motion studies of animals in 1872 by filming a running horse, in 1879 he created a series of trip wires that would trigger over 40 cameras, later running the images together through a projector to create what would look like film.

2. How did sound synchronization affect the film industry?

From the advent of the Vitaphone by Warner Bros. to the supersession of that by Sound on Film, sound synchronization affected the film industry in many ways. First, it showed directors that there was an easier method of including more than just music on movies, that they wouldn't have to just play a song alongside the film. Also, from this came two entirely new genres that would benefit rather well from the addition of sound. Gangster movies, and musicals of course. The addition of sound also eventually helped perfect the standardization of filmmaking and global marketing, evident in films such as *The Wizard of Oz* and *Gone With the Wind*.

3. How and why did the Golden Age of Hollywood end?

Due to the antitrust laws of the 1940's and the HUAC of the 1950's, the tastes of audiences were changing, and studios began to lose control over every aspect of what went into the making of films and eventually only controlled the financial aspects of them, leaving the rest to production companies. There was also the introduction of television in the time soon after bringing up big competition of Hollywood cinema, ultimately putting the final end to all things Golden in the then current age of cinema.

4. What is the significance of the French New Wave?
