

That the end of the Golden Age began in the late '40s and early '50s, when the studio system and its monopoly was overturned by when television began to change the nature of movie-going.


As an example, the movie "The Moon is Blue" marked the first time a movie was released to theatres without the traditional stamp of movie came out in 1953.


