Werner Herzog is unlike any other filmmaker in the history of cinema. There are few filmmakers that create their own class. Werner Herzog is one of them. This is what sets Herzog apart from other filmmakers is his ability to stretch a little a very long way. Herzog also greatly damaged his reputation by shooting in areas of Brazil that were not welcoming but continuing to film there without the blessing of the locals. He was made to look like a villain in the eyes of the local indians, some claiming he would murder whole tribes after raping the woman. This does not seem to face him as he puts Guerrilla filmmaking to work. Herzog would die to tell a story he believed in. He would go to all the possible lengths to see a project through. this is why he deserves a category all his own.
